Conservation of the Tredwell Dresses:

Phase I Completed

Last fall, thanks to a generous leadership grant from the Samuel H. Kress Foundation, the Museum began a project to conserve its remarkable collection of 30 19th-century dresses documented to have belonged to the Tredwells. We are pleased to report that Phase I of the three-phase project has been completed. The condition of each dress, with its accompanying accessories such as petticoat, undersleeves, chemisette, and collar, has been carefully assessed. A research report, with detailed description, photographs, and recommended conservation treatment has been prepared by costume conservator Helen Kapodistrias, who conserved the Tredwell dress currently on exhibition.

Examination of the Tredwell costumes has only reiterated the significance of the Museum's collection. Treasures in the collection include two dresses with full *gigot* sleeves from the 1830s, both typical examples of high fashion as seen in the colored fashion plates of the period. Rarer still is a cream, empire-waist dress, circa 1815, embellished with chain-stitch embroidery. Lastly, the extraordinary lace and velvet trims found on numerous elegant evening gowns truly distinguish the Tredwells as belonging to the wealthy merchant class.

Many of the Tredwell dresses are in very good condition, but a number of gowns are in dire need of conservation and will remain in storage until they can be properly restored. We look forward to continuing with the next phase of the project in order to safely display them to the public.

"With This Ring". An 1872 Wedding at Home in New York

The Merchant's House Museum cordially invites you to attend a spring wedding, 1870s style. The Museum is very fortunate to have a comprehensive collection of original objects documenting an 1872 Tredwell wedding and this spring will present the exhibition "With This Ring": An 1872 Wedding at Home in New York City. On view in the front parlor will be the centerpiece of the exhibition -- a high-style peach cream silk faille bridal gown with a lavishly fringed bodice and a sweeping train.

The dress belonged to Sarah Ann Tredwell, who wore it at her marriage to Abram Howard in 1872 at her parents' home on Ninth Avenue. The bride was the granddaughter of Captain John Tredwell, a cousin of Seabury Tredwell. Sarah's bridal gown is part of the Museum's collection of objects that belonged to collateral relatives of the Tredwells who lived at 29 East Fourth Street.

In addition to the wedding dress, the exhibition will feature the satin high button shoes, the petticoat, and the earrings worn by the bride, as well as the silk and wax orange blossoms she wore in her hair. All were donated to the Museum by a descendant of Captain Tredwell in the 1960s. More recently, Kathleen Howard, Sarah Ann's greatgranddaughter, made a gift of Sarah Ann

and Abram's marriage certificate to the Museum. It is signed by The Rev. Dr. John R. Lundy, Rector of the Church of the Holy Apostles, who performed the Episcopalian ceremony.

The marriage certificate, along with an invitation to the wedding and reception, will be some of the additional items on view in the ground-floor display cases. Traditions such as creating a trousseau, giving the wedding breakfast, and taking the bridal tour will also be explained. We hope you will be able to attend this unique exhibition recreating a 19th-century wedding at home in New York City. No RSVPs necessary.

"We Bear Thee to an Honored Grave": New York Grieves for President Lincoln

The Civil War had just ended and emotions were already running high on April 14, 1865, when Abraham Lincoln was assassinated. His tragic death plunged New York City and the nation into a period of unprecedented public mourning fueled by recent advances in communication via telegraph and print. A funeral journey acrsoss numerous states was planned by railroad. Stops included Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, and Chicago.

New York City prepared a grand reception for Lincoln's remains when they arrived on April 24. Borne through the streets in an elaborate funeral procession, the president's body lay in state at City Hall for almost 24 hours. Thousands of New Yorkers waited patiently in line to pay their last respects. On April 25, a second procession carried the coffin to the Hudson River Railroad depot as the journey continued towards Albany.

Eliza Tredwell and her children were already in deep mourning when the president was shot. Only five weeks earlier Seabury Tredwell had died at the age of 85. For the Tredwells,

and thousands of other New York families grieving privately for loved ones lost during the Civil War, Lincoln's funeral proceedings must have been especially poignant.
